- At least part-time employed Did not answer "do not know / not sure" when it came to their employer's approach to open source.



Methodology

Fielding:

Survey was fielded for 6 weeks (May to June 2022)

Sample Size:

- 1,050 "starts" European respondents who qualified for the survey.
- 750 completed questions pertaining to open source consumption.
- 670 respondents completed the survey from beginning to end.

Qualitative Interviews:

16 interviews with experts from the public sector, private sector, and academia



Key Findings

Imbalance between Consumption and Contribution by Organisations

Consumption

Comparison of the extent to which open source consumption is permitted at the respondents' organisations by organisation size.



Takeaway: Policies encourage open source consumption, but the bigger an org is, the more likely it is to attach limiting conditions.



Contribution

Variations in contribution policy based on the organisational sector.



Takeaway: The public, education, finance, and insurance sectors encourage contributions the least and mostly do not have policies. Result: orgs in these sectors tend to 'take' more than they 'give'.

A view across Europe

The perceived importance of open source and how it flows into consumption and contribution in various European countries.



Consumption / contribution imbalance

Takeaway: There is an imbalance between contribution and consumption policies, with 43% reporting a lack of clear contribution policy, compared to 20% reporting a lack of clear consumption policy. Impact of Leadership & Structured Approach to OSS within Orgs

Impact of Leadership & Structured Approach

- **Context:** The route to unlocking value from open source goes far beyond simply creating the right policies.
- **Finding:** Organisations with a structured approach to open source via an OSPO, or simply visible leaders, tend to have an organisational culture that encourages and empowers employees to contribute to open source.
- **Finding:** Organisations at the two extremes of the scale (<10 or >10,000 employees) tend to have an OSPO or visible leader, while mid-sized organisations tend to lack both.
- **Takeaway:** Clear leadership pays dividends, with micro- and enterprise-scale organisations leading the way on open source.



Open source leadership

Presence and permissiveness of a consumption policy at the respondent's organisation relative to the presence or absence of an OSPO and/or a clear and visible leader for an open source strategy.





Open source leadership (continued)

Perceived change in the value derived from open source at the respondent's organisation relative to the presence or absence of an OSPO and/or a clear and visible leader for an open source strategy.





The Public Sector is Lagging Behind

The Public Sector is Lagging Behind

- **Progress:** Government bodies in Europe are increasingly prescribing open source consumption and sharing code in the open, primarily for transparency reasons.
- **But**: Limited inner source activity, which indicates a lack of collaboration within and between public sector organisations, and a lack of clear contribution policies, which potentially suggests an overly narrow appreciation of OSS's value as a mechanism for transparency rather than for collective value creation.
- **Takeaway:** With the public sector having so much to gain from open source, much needs to be done to create a cultural shift. Policies that simply mandate consumption and that 'code must be shared' miss out on much of the value that open source has to offer.



OSS Enables Digital Sovereignty

OSS Enables Digital Sovereignty

- **Context:** Digital sovereignty is high on political agendas across Europe. There is a clear need to create and sustain the mechanisms that will enable Europe to plot its own course in the digital world.
- **Findings:** Open source is a powerful mechanism for innovation, collective value creation, and ultimately bringing the vision of the 'digital commons' to life. There should be further investment in open source alternatives to technology monopolies.
- **Takeaway**: OSS can be an apolitical key to foster digital sovereignty. Open source drives value for all, breeds digital products and services that anyone can use, ensures space for constraint-free collaboration, and creates rich environments for skills and capability development.



Conclusions

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- Organisations should address the imbalance between consumption and contribution through clear policies.
- Clear leadership and a structured approach (e.g. via OSPO) pays dividends, with micro-scale and enterprise-scale organisations leading the way on open source.
- The public sector is struggling to realise the value of open source for their citizens.
- Open source is a powerful mechanism for achieving digital sovereignty. Governments should invest in open source.
